The next "Golf in a Week" class starts on April 21st. Classes are an hour each day beginning at 7:00 pm and run for 5 consecutive days. Courses aimed at beginner and intermediate golfers. It covers all aspects of the game: Safety, Rules, Etiquette, Swing Method, and an on course Texas scramble. All equipment and range balls are supplied. The cost is 600 SAR. Rules

The 20 Most Important Rule Changes for 2019

- 1. Search time—Reduced from 5 minutes to 3 minutes.
- 2. Ball moved during search—Replace with no penalty.
- 3. Embedded ball—Free relief anywhere in the general area.
- 4. Measuring a drop—Use longest club (except putter).
- 5. Dropping—Drop from knee height rather than from shoulder height.
- 6. Taking stance on the wrong green is no longer allowed.
- 7. Ball unintentionally hits player or equipment—No penalty.
- 8. Double hit—No penalty; now counts as only one shot.
- 9. Touching sand in bunker incidentally is permitted.
- 10.Loose impediments can be removed anywhere including hazards.
- 11. Dropping a ball outside of a bunker—two penalty strokes.
- 12. Water hazards—Now called "Penalty Areas."
- 13. Touching ground in penalty area—No penalty.
- 14.Ball moves on green after being marked—Replace without penalty.
- 15.Ball accidentally moved on putting green—Replace without penalty.
- 16.All damage to green can now be repaired.
- 17. Positioning a club for alignment is not permitted.
- 18. Caddie assisting with alignment is not permitted.
- 19. Putting with flag stick in the hole is now permitted.
- 20.Ball wedged against the flag stick and the side of the hole is deemed as holed.

HC Stroke Allocation for Mixed Competitions

At RHGC our year long Match Play Ladders are mixed competitions. The rules for allocating Handicap strokes are as per Section 9-3 of the USGA Handicap Manual (excerpts below). Since our Red Tees have a higher course rating than our White Tees this means that if you're playing in a mixed match, the lady will get one additional stroke if getting strokes (ie. she has a higher handicap), or will give one less stroke if giving strokes (ie. she has a lower handicap).

In any Stroke Play Competition where men and women are competing together with women playing from the Red Tees and men playing from the White Tees, the women will add one stroke to their Course Handicap.

To ensure fair play in all our mixed competitions, please be sure to follow these Stroke Allocation Rules.

9-3. Assignment of Strokes

a. Where To Apply Strokes

For formats in which handicap strokes are used on specific holes during the course of play, a player generally takes them in the order assigned on the scorecard. For example, a player receiving three strokes takes them on the first, second, and third stroke holes.

In mixed competitions where players play their own ball and where allocations are different for men and women, the players receive strokes based on their respective stroke allocations.

In mixed foursome and selected drive match play competitions, strokes are received based on the men's allocation.

c. Players Competing From Different Tees or Men and Women From Same Tees

(i) Different Tees: Men vs. Men; Women vs. Women; Women vs. Men

Different tees usually have different ratings. Since a <u>USGA Course Rating</u> reflects the probable scores of a <u>scratch golfer</u>, the higher-rated course is more difficult, and the player playing from the set of tees with the higher <u>USGA Course Rating</u> receives additional stroke(s) equal to the difference between each <u>USGA Course Rating</u>, with the resulting figure rounded off to the nearest whole number (.5 or more is rounded upward). (See Decision <u>3-5/1</u>.)

Example: If women playing from the forward tees, from which the women's <u>USGA Course Rating</u> is 71.5, compete against men playing from the middle tees, from which the men's <u>USGA Course Rating</u> is 70.2, the women will add one stroke (71.5 - 70.2 = 1.3 rounded to 1) to <u>Course Handicap</u>.


Grounds


Holes 6-7-8-9-10-11-12-15 have had all, or a significant portion, of the Tamarisk removed. The Grounds Crew are in the process of grooming the Tamarisk zones to make these areas more playable. If you find your ball in a hole that was related to the Tamarisk removal then you have the option of declaring this Abnormal Conditions and proceeding with relief from Ground Under Repair. Please do not abuse this rule and remember to always discuss with your playing partner. Below is the USGA Definition of Ground Under Repair.

Ground Under Repair (GUR)

Any part of the course the Committee defines to be ground under repair (whether by marking it or otherwise). Ground under repair also includes the following things, even if the Committee does not define them as such:

- Any hole made by the Committee or the maintenance staff in:
 - O Setting up the course (such as a hole where a stake has been removed or the hole on a double green being used for the play of another hole), or
 - O Maintaining the course (such as a hole made in removing turf or a tree stump or laying pipelines, but not including aeration holes).
- Grass cuttings, leaves and any other material piled for later removal. But:
 - O Any natural materials that are piled for removal are also loose impediments, and
 - O Any materials left on the course that are not intended to be removed are not ground under repair unless the Committee has defined them as such.
- Any animal habitat (such as a bird's nest) that is so near your ball that your stroke or stance might damage
 it, except when the habitat has been made by animals that are defined as loose impediments (such as
 worms or insects).

If you see your playing partner abusing this responsibility, please point out that everyone must lend a hand and not rely on others to carry the load.
