#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Fall is just a few weeks away and this marks the start of a busy tournament run. Between now and the end of October, RHGC will be hosting seven tournaments including the Saudi National Day, the Oilman's, and the Club Championship. Look for more information about these three tournaments on page 8 of this newsletter. The others are listed on Tournament Calendar on website. Additionally, please be reminded that to play in RHGC tournaments, you need to complete the Code of Conduct agreement. ### Ground Under Repair - Burnt Areas on Fairway

Due to irrigation issues, part of the course is not getting the required water which has resulted in many of the green areas of the course burning and dying in the sun. In an effort to protect these burnt areas, a decision has been taken to deem with immediate effect, all burnt areas on the fairways as GUR (Ground Under Repair).

Therefore, relief needs to be taken in line with rule 16:

16.1b (see Rule 16) Relief for Ball in General Area

If a player's ball is in the <u>general area</u> and there is interference by an <u>abnormal course condition</u> on the <u>course</u>, the player may take free relief by <u>dropping</u> the original ball or another ball in this <u>relief area</u> (see Rule 14.3):



Reference Point: The <u>nearest point of complete relief</u> in the <u>general area</u>.

Size of Relief Area Measured from Reference Point: One <u>club-length</u>, but with these limits:

- Must be in the *general area*,
- Must not be nearer the *hole* than the reference point, and
- There must be complete relief from all interference by the *abnormal course condition*.

We anticipate this change will help accommodate many more women and we look forward to welcoming newcomers to our activities!





#### HANDICAP CORNER

#### **Away Scores**

**Question:** Do I need to post Away scores?

Answer: Yes, score must be posted as long as the round meets the criteria for an acceptable score (see Rule 2.1 of the Rules of Handicapping). Any rounds played on a course other than the Home course should receive an Away or "A" score-type when posting the score.

In GHIN you can search for Course under "Enter Course Name" then select the tees played and number of holes (9/18). If you cannot find Course, you can click "Manually Post Total Score" and you will need the slope and rating of Course, usually found on the scorecard.

#### 3 Things to Know About 3 World Handicap System<sup>TM</sup> Safeguards

The World Handicap System includes three new safeguards that protect the integrity of your *Handicap Index*®. When the World Handicap System (WHS<sup>TM</sup>) was implemented in January 2020, three new safeguards designed to protect the integrity of your Handicap Index® were built into the system. Now that more golfers are seeing these features come into play, here are three things to know about each one:

#### Playing Conditions Calculation (PCC)

#### 1) The PCC is entirely based on scoring data.

Simply put, the PCC compares the actual scores made at a given course each day to the expected scores of the players who made them. If the number of players who score at or below their expected score is higher than anticipated, the course played easier. If the number of players who score at or below their expected score is lower than anticipated, the course played more difficult. PCC adjustments are applied automatically and clearly identified within a player's scoring record.

#### 2) The more scores, the better!

For the calculation to take place, at least 8 scores must be posted at a course by players with a Handicap Index of 36.0 or below – and the more scores that are posted, the more reliable the data becomes. The calculation also takes into consideration each player's Course Handicap<sup>TM</sup> and the Course Rating<sup>TM</sup> and Slope Rating® of the tees that were played.

#### 3) When you post matters!

The PCC takes place at the end of each day, so only scores posted on the day of play will contribute to the data pool. So, let's all do our part by posting scores on the same day of play. With that said, if you forget to post on the same day, the result of the PCC will still be applied to your score when it is posted - as long as you post it to the appropriate date.



#### HANDICAP CORNER

(continued)

#### Soft Cap and Hard Cap

#### 1) It starts with your Low Handicap Index®.

A Low Handicap Index serves as the baseline for the cap procedure and is the lowest Handicap Index achieved by a player within the 365-day period preceding the most recent score in their scoring record. A player does not establish a Low Handicap Index until they have 20 scores in their scoring record.

#### 2) The caps are applied automatically.

Each time your Handicap Index updates, the new value is compared to your Low Handicap Index and:

- If a 3.0 stroke increase takes place, the Soft Cap reduces the rate of upward movement of Handicap Index beyond 3.0 strokes by 50 percent.
- If a 5.0 stroke increase takes place (after the Soft Cap is applied) the Hard Cap prevents any additional upward movement of Handicap Index from taking place.

#### 3) The Handicap Committee can override the cap – but only if necessary.

All of us as golfers experience a poor stretch from time to time – but since underlying ability does not typically change significantly over a short period, a player's Handicap Index usually works its way back toward their Low Handicap Index. However, if a player experiences an injury or illness that causes higher scores and the cap(s) to be applied, the Handicap Committee at their Home Club can override the cap by adjusting their Handicap Index to a level reflective of their current ability.

#### **Exceptional Score Reduction (ESR)**

#### 1) A score 7 strokes or better than player's Handicap Index is considered exceptional.

WHS research shows that a player who shoots an exceptional score is more likely than others to score at/below their Handicap Index in subsequent rounds. As a result, the ESR is designed to better reflect demonstrated ability and player from having an advantage.

#### 2) The procedure is simple.

When a score is between 7.0 and 9.9 strokes better than the player's Handicap Index at the time the round was played, their Handicap Index is reduced by 1 stroke. If the score is 10.0 strokes or better, their Handicap Index is reduced by 2 strokes.

#### 3) The impact of the ESR diminishes over time.

When an ESR takes place, a -1 or -2 adjustment is applied to the most recent 20 score differentials in the player's scoring record. However, scores made from that point forward will not include the -1 or -2 adjustment – unless they are also exceptional – which allows the ESR to work itself out of the player's scoring record over time.

Community Services recently introduced a revised Golf Cart Safety

Manual with updates to the safety standards for golf cart operation in all Company Communities. The safety manual specifies that all golf carts must undergo an annual mechanical and safety inspection. Please reference your Company email or visit the <a href="RHGC website for details">RHGC website for details</a>.

Additionally, Golf Cart Operator cards will be required to drive a golf cart. If you don't own a cart but rent through the Starter, you will be required to show your Operator card when renting. Community Services has indicated that beginning October 1, you will be able to drive your personal cart anywhere on camp as a vehicle.

Cart Operator Cards will be printed out shortly and will be available for pickup at the Starter for those who have successfully passed the Operator quiz. More details will be announced to members soon.

**COMPETITION WINNERS** - The Men's Club Champion will be the man returning the Low Gross score over 36 holes from the Championship Tees. The Women's Club Champion will be the woman returning the Low Gross score over 36 holes from the Championship Tees.


